The Care Quality Commission is not routinely inspecting services during the COVID-19 pandemic. We are maintaining contact with providers through existing monitoring arrangements and engagement and support calls covering four assessment areas:

- Assurance Processes, Monitoring and Risk Management

Yes Staff health, safety and wellbeing were protected despite the increased pressures associated with COVID-19. 4.2 Had the provider been able to implement effective systems to monitor and react to the overall quality and safety of care Yes There were effective systems to monitor the overall quality and safety of care being provided at the service during the COVID19 pandemic. 4.3 Is the provider able to support staff to raise concerns during the pandemic? Yes Staff were able to raise concerns and were supported to speak up during the pandemic. Had care and treatment provided to people being sufficiently recorded 4.4 during the Covid-19 pandemic? Yes Care and treatment provided to people is being sufficiently recorded during the Covid-19 pandemic. Had the provider been able to work effectively with system partners when 4.5 care and treatment is commissioned, shared or transferred?

Yes Working arrangements and information sharing with system partners during the Covid-19 pandemic are effective.

Overall summary

Harley House Care Home fully implemented the Covid guidance and has maintained a Covid-free home. The provider's business continuity plan, policies and procedures has been updated to ensure everyone stays safe and well. Staff had completed PPE training and had adequate supply of PPE. Laundry and cleaning regime has minimised the Covid risks. Staffing has been managed with good clinical support. Registered manager demonstrated good communication, support and supervisions provided to staff. Safeguards to protect people from the risk of abuse remain in place. New risk assessments and care plans have been implemented. These have been kept under review. People receive the care and support they need, they have enough to eat and drink and support with their medicines. Staff have monitored people's physical well-being for symptoms of COVID. There was good relations with GP and other health and social care professionals. People's rights were being upheld and their diverse needs respected. Social interests and activities have been provided in a safe way. Contact with family and links with the local community and nurseries has been maintained. New initiatives and systems developed were well received. This included the positive social distancing dining experience for people and for staff the laundry service for their uniforms and access to mental and emotional wellbeing support. Regular guality audits and checks were carried out. Premises and equipment had been serviced and maintained. Home testing kits have been used and more kits have been ordered. The registered manager has good relations and has regular contact with CCG, the local authority and CQC. The NHSC capacity tracker has been completed regularly.
