For most people in Zimbabwe, Christmas day starts with a Church service. After the Church service, everyone has a party in their home and then go from house to house, visiting all their family and friends on the way. Sometimes, this can take up the rest of the day! At every house we have something to eat, exchange presents and enjoy the party and we do a great deal of dancing!

The special food eaten at Christmas in Zimbabwe is Chicken with rice and

plenty of Coleslaw!

The Christmas Cards that are used in Zimbabwe sometimes have African pictures on them, such as wild animals, but most are now imported, so they have the traditional 'snow scenes' and pictures of the Christmas story on them.

In Hungary, Christmas Eve is very important and is called 'Szent-este' which means Holy Evening. People spend the evening with their family and decorate the Christmas Tree. Sometimes only the adults decorate the tree (without the children there), so when children come in and see the tree, it's a great surprise and they are told that angels brought the tree for them! The main Christmas meal, which is also eaten on Christmas Eve, consists of any freshwater fish (often fish soup called 'Halászlé').

Christmas holidays are the time to visit families and enjoy a variety of traditional food together. The Midnight Mass service is very popular in Hungary. Most people go to Church after their Christmas meal.

On Christmas Eve children also hope that they will be left some presents under the Christmas Tree. They're told that the presents are brought by Jesus. Children wait outside the room where the tree is and when they hear bells ringing, they can enter, and the presents await them under the Christmas tree. That's how I remember it! My mother would send my brother and myself for a long walk with my dad, which I used to love. In the meantime my mom would very quickly decorate the Christmas tree and put presents under it. Then my dad and us would come back home to ask if 'baby Jesus has been yet' Our mom would say that she needed to check on it and open the door where the Christmas tree was. She would then ring the bell...best memory ever!

In Ukraine, Advent is the beginning of Christmas Time. It's a time when people try to be peaceful and remember the real reason for Christmas. Christmas Day is most celebrated during Christmas holidays and is often a 'fasting day' meaning that some people don't eat anything until Christmas Supper. It's traditional that no food is eaten until the first star is seen in the sky! Looking for the first star is also a reminder of the Wisemen who followed a star to visit Jesus.

On the table there are 12 dishes - they are meant to give you good luck

for the next 12 months. In my home all my family, young and old, gather around the table to enjoy and share the food. We give our Christmas presents on New Year! It is because in older times Christmas used to be celebrated around 7<sup>th</sup> January.

Do you know someone seeking a Care Home for a loved one? If you refer a resident, who comes to live at The Willows, you can receive a reward!


